A LETTER FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

DEAR FRIENDS AND
MEMBERS OF OUR LOTUS
OUTREACH COMMUNITY.

In early 2020 we had just emerged from a year of rapid growth and sparks were flying. Whether access to education on buses and bikes, skills training or village health projects, everything was in a rapid growth phase and continued that way until March 23 and the arrival of the Covid-19 epidemic and subsequent lockdowns. The epidemic brought unprecedented challenges and hardships across the globe for everyone; women, rural communities, children and youth from poor families, those at the heart of all our projects, were disproportionately impacted.

Our immediate response was to analyze the impact of lockdown on all our projects and figure out how to respond and adapt projects to continue providing services at the highest possible level and also invited our community to contribute to

our Lotus Relief emergency response efforts. We are deeply thankful for your generous contributions.

In the first months of the epidemic were able to provide more than 8,000 meals as emergency rations to families of daily-wage workers without income and in desperate need to feed their families. We provided masks, soap, hand sanitizer, and disinfectant to ensure the safety of almost 1,000 front line health workers and rural populations while community based education campaigns provided village families vital information about the dangers of Covid-19 and how to avoid infection.

Ensuring equal access to quality education has always been central to our programing and school closures and interruption to community education projects brought the digital divide into a much sharper focus than ever before. Having local staff and project partners on the ground enabled us to

move quickly to provide smart-phones and online support groups for our university and high school scholars while our community based teachers kept the light of education burning in the hearts and minds of hundreds of slum and village children by providing them daily classes one on one and in small groups.

While the epidemic presented unprecedented challenges, there were also many bright spots in the year. Fifteen year old LO Ambassador April Cheng helped us reach our 1000 Bikes Campaign goal of \$75,000, hosting the second annual fundraiser hosted by LO Taiwan. April led a team of nine of her friends from BeiZheng High School with their class teacher for a Riding for Girls Taiwan 1,000 Bikes event. It stretched over three days and four nights, raising funds and also nurturing seeds of awareness and a sense of global responsibility in upcoming generations, which is an extremely important and satisfying impact of our bike ride events across the globe.

2020 was again a significant year for LO in terms of support for education over the lifetime of children in our care, marked by our first ever gathering of some 61 alumna and CATALYST project scholars in Siem Reap. The joyous event was a culmination of more than 14 years of educational support provided to some fifteen hundred scholars, many of which have now completed tertiary studies and gone on to well paid jobs.

In the midst of all the struggle and strife of 2020 we could not have imagined a better end to the year when twenty-eight of our scholars donned their academic gowns and flung their caps in their air after graduating university with a four year degree! We are delighted to share their stories of hope and empowerment along with details of our many other achievements during the course of the year in this report.

January 18th, 2020 Lotus Outreach Cambodia (LOCAM) celebrated our first ever Alumnae Gathering in Siem Reap, Cambodia. After 14 years of providing scholarships through GATE, in addition to university scholars since 2010, this was a monumental occasion for the scholarship recipients of LO programs.

Lotus Outreach Alumnae initiated formalizing an LOCAM Alumnae Association and a Pay-It-Forward group meeting to initiate projects that will benefit LO Alumna and Cambodian society at large. It was incredibly moving to be together with so many of the young women LO supported year after year. Their passion and commitment to pay forward the compassion, opportunity, and transformation that was made available to them is inspirational beyond measure.

One of the first alumna of the program, Sima, gave an impressive and touching testimonial in English (translated into Khmer by LOCAM's Project Officer Sima graduated high school under GATE in 2010 and received her BA in Law through CATALYST in 2014.) She shared with those in attendance about her life, study, and work experiences.

"When I was in ninth grade, I wanted to drop out because my parents could not afford school. Luckily, I received scholarship support from Lotus Outreach which provided me with enough uniforms to wear, books to study, and a bike to ride to school. I could study tuition classes like other students. As a result, my study got better and better every year until I passed high school in 2010."

"In November of 2010 I left Banteay Meanchey Province to study in Phnom Penh City. I knew nothing in Phnom Penh but I had someone behind me who was not only kind to me, but kind to everyone. I was very lucky to meet her. She is the Country Representative of Lotus Outreach Cambodia. That said, I would like to thank Lotus Outreach for financial, spiritual, and material support for myself and other students. Without you, our lives would not be bright."

Sima went on to encourage juniors to study and work hard to position themselves for success in the future. She left them with a poignant message: "Failure is a starting point to becoming successful."



LOTUS PEDALS

Lotus Pedals provides heavy terrain bicycles to girls in rural India and Cambodia so that they can traverse the long distances to the nearest school.



Despite school closures and lockdowns during 2020, we managed to provide 251 students bicycles and therefore access

to education.

34 senior high school students in Phnom Penh were provided internet cards for access to online studies and every one of them graduated Year 12! What's App Groups were created to support high school students' online studies and smart-phones were distributed where needed.

Buddha Smiles provides after school education and tutoring to children of the poorest migrant families and socially marginalized groups in Tamil Nadu, India.







CASE STUDY I:

SANGEETA, BLOSSOM BUS

Sangeeta is 19-years-old and studies in 11th grade. She's been riding the Blossom Bus for two years and is at the top of her class! She lives in Bholara, a remote village in Palwal District, Haryana. Before the bus came to her village, Sangeeta had no choice but to walk to school. "Walking to school in the heat of summer, during heavy rains and especially in winter, when the fog is so thick you can't see where you are going, made it very difficult to attend school regularly and I missed many days of school each month. Now I am able to attend school every day and I'm standing 1st in my class! My favorite subject is history. After high school, I want to complete college and work as a history teacher."



Sageeta's parents both work labor on a farm and don't have any land of their own. Despite both being illiterate they have managed to ensure a high school education for all five of their children. Sageeta is the youngest. Her father Krishan tells us, "We have to work very hard to educate our children and we don't ask Sangeeta to do any housework so she can focus on studying." Her mother Sukhavati added "I feel very ashamed that I am totally illiterate and never went to school a single day. I don't want my children to have the life I have and am very happy they are all getting educated."

We are so happy to see families like Sangeeta's who are uncompromising in supporting their children's education and we are honored to be able to support their success.





CASE STUDY II:

VOTEY, LOTUS PEDALS

Votey is one of our 100 GATE recipients studying in 7th grade at a Lower Secondary School in Siem Reap. Lotus Pedals provided 251 bike scholarships to students during 2020 and Votey was one of the girls to receive a bike. Votey is 13 years old and is the third child of six siblings. Her parents have a cart from which they sell fruits in the Angkor Wat area, earning together around \$150 a month to support their eight person family. In primary school, Votey would share a ride to school on her sister's bicycle, but when Votey went on to Secondary School this was no longer an option as the school is much further from her home and in



a different direction than her sister's school. As her family could not afford another bicycle during the pandemic and with no other means of transportation, Votey was at risk of having to drop out. Luckily, Votey heard about Lotus Pedals. She applied and now has a new bicycle of her own. She said, "I will take good care of the bicycle and will study hard to finish school and become a teacher. Thank you for your kindness."

A bicycle can mean a world of difference. We are so happy to be able to support girls like Votey in breaking barriers in their families and communities through simple and innovative solutions.

CASE STUDY III:

SHABNAM, SKILLS TRAINING 4 EMPLOYMENT



Shabnam is nineteen-years old and lives in Bawana JJ (a slum resettlement colony) in New Delhi. She lives with her parents, sister, brother, sister-in-law, and nephew. She is the youngest in her family and attended our EQU+ program classes through her 8th grade.

Shabnam was interested in sewing from a young age and had even requested a local tailor to teach her cutting and sewing techniques. Unfortunately, after seeking out this opportunity, she didn't feel that she benefited from this apprenticeship, and felt limited by her options. When our STEP (Skills Training 4 Employment) program launched in November of 2020, Shabnam was overjoyed and quickly enrolled.

STEP workshops are a 6-month immersion into the art and craft of tailoring and sewing clothes. The young women enrolled in the program are taught all the skills they need to be successful tailors at home and in their communities. Our STEP trainer, Fatima, said that Shabnam was a keen student and worked hard to master the skills she was taught in class. By the end of her training she was already stitching clothes for herself and her family. Shabnam recently updated us on her progress- she's making clothes for others in her neighborhood and getting paid well for her work. She further told us, "I can now make different styles of Salwar Kurta (traditional everyday and fancy ladies wear). I already have a few orders to complete with more coming in since the festival season is around the corner."

During the pandemic, Shabnam also volunteered to distribute cooked meals to those in need. Beneficiaries of our programs, young women like Shabnam, lead the way in giving back to their communities. We are so happy to support the success and wellbeing of the young women and girls our programs support.

ASHA

ASHA improves women and children's village health care by training local government health care workers, ensuring better quality and increasing access by educating their communities about vital health care rights and practices in rural Rajasthan.

In 2020 we helped train 165 local health worker activists in 65 villages, directly serving 5,729 including those individuals impacted by LotusRelief



In **2020**, we helped train **165 local health worker activists** in 65 villages directly serving 5,279 community members, including those individuals impacted by Lotus Relief.



LotusRelief worked with the ASHA program training frontline health workers and delivering **22,500** bars of soap,



CASE STUDY IV:

THANGFA, GATE, LOTUS PEDALS, R4E, BAYON PASTRY, & CATALYST

Thangfa is a first-year student studying Business Management at Build Bright University in Phnom Penh through our CATALYST university scholarship program. Thangfa is the sixth child of seven siblings and is the only one who has come this far in her education. Most of her siblings did not attend school past the second grade.

Thangfa's family has always struggled financially. For many years her mother grew vegetables on a small plot of land, and Thangfa would sell the veggies on the street. Still, her mother insisted Thangfa continue to attend school. Thangfa walked 3 km to get to school every day until she reached 9th grade. She told us, "It was very difficult having no means of transportation to get to school; sometimes I wanted to drop out, but because I love studying, I was willing to walk to school."

In addition to the long walk each day, Thangfa was burdened by her concern for her family's financial situation. She felt bad that she wasn't helping out by getting a job. While in 10th grade, her mother became sick, and the family fell deeper into debt. Thangfa's grades suffered, and she often wanted to drop. Her mother, however, continuously encouraged her to stay in school.

During her last year of high school, Thangfa applied for scholarship support through GATE. Thangfa was approved, and with this support she became more motivated. She said, "After receiving the scholarship, my family and I were very happy. The program provided me with materials for study, money for tuition classes,



mental support, and some community. It made a difference in my studies." The GATE scholarship includes school supplies and tuition fees, rice support for families, academic monitoring, and a bicycle for access to education. Supported by all of this, Thangfa completed and passed her studies, deciding at the end to pursue a college degree.

Regrettably, Thangfa's mother died in 2020 while Thangfa was in her first year of her studies through CATALYST, our university scholarship program. Although this Thangfa has remained committed to her educational goals as she sees it as the best way to help her family. She has received a bicycle through Lotus Pedals to get to school, which is 6 km from the CATALYST

residential home, where she now lives. Thangfa also completed a baking course with our partner, Bayon Pastry, so that she can work as a baker and receive a decent monthly income.

"The bicycle has given me the freedom of mobility and serves as a bridge to a better future. If I didn't get the support from Lotus Outreach, I would have been doing labor work in Thailand now. Thank you so much."

Our innovative and multi-dimensional programs work together to support young women like Thangfa to realize their dreams. Thank you for your partnership in creating change and transformation in the lives of many students like her.











CASE STUDY V:

RIYA, CONSOLING THROUGH COUNSELING AND REINTEGRATION (CTC)

This story contains sexual assault*

Riya is 10 years old and studies in third grade. Her devastating story is typical of the kind of experiences that girls and women have before they join the residential Consoling through Counseling and Reintegration program, managed by our long-term partners in rural Cambodia.

Riya's father left her mother soon after she was born. Soon after that, her mother remarried a man who, early on in their marriage, showed abusive tendencies, often using violence to control Riya and her mother.

While Riya's mother supported her family with a day job, making close to nothing, her step-father stayed home unemployed. Riya would help manage the household chores and care for her younger step-brother while her mother was at work. It was at these times that Riya would be left alone with her step-father, who repeatedly sexaully assaulted her. He threatened to kill her if she told anyone. Riya felt trapped in an impossible situation, remaining silent.

One day when her step-father attempted to rape her, Riya ran to where her mother was working in the fields. He chased her, but Riya found the courage to tell her mother about the abuses she had endured. When Riya explained what had happened, her mother immediately went to the village chief and to the police to make a complaint. Her husband was arrested and taken to jail that day.

After that, Riya was brought to the CTC safe shelter by her mother, who felt she needed further care and support. Since then, Riya has received counseling, medical treatment, and legal assistance to support her case. Providing legal support ensures that survivors can hold perpetrators accountable and supports their confidence that it's possible to stop the cycle of abuse and the stigma surrounding abuse.

CTC creates a safe and supportive environment for young women and girls like Riya to process trauma with the support and encouragement they need so that they can move forward, heal, and be voices of strength at home and in their communities


